His poetry has appeared in four separate Best Anthologies. He is Associate Professor of English at Syracuse University where he teaches in the MFA Program in Creative Writing.

Jules Gibbs is the author of a book of poems, Bliss Crisis, published by The Sheep Meadow Press, and a chapbook, The Bulk of the Mailable Universe, published by Dancing Girl Press. She's been a fellow at the Ucross Foundation, Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, and Willapa Bay Artist-in-Residency program. Her work was chosen by Kim Addonizio for the Best New Poets anthology, and she has been the four-time recipient of Dorothy Sargent Rosenberg Prize for Poetry. Tamara Kamenszain was born in Buenos Aires in 1947. She edited the independent magazine, 2001 before becoming editor of the cultural pages of the newspapers La Opinionand Clarin. In 1972 Kamenszain received the poetry prize of the National Arts Fund of Argentina for From this Side of the Mediterranean, her first book of poems, published in Buenos Aires in 1973. Kamenszain has taught at the University of Buenos Aires and the University of Mexico and worked for the National Endowment for the Arts in Mexico and the Ministry of Culture in Argentina. A prolific author, among her many works are El texto silencioso, Tradición y vanguardia en la poesía sudamericana, La casa grande , Vida de living, La edad de la poesía, Tango bar, El Ghetto and Solos y solas. Kamenszain has been awarded a number of prizes, such as the John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship, and the Pablo Neruda Presidential Medal, among others.

Colleen Kattau

Colleen Kattau is an Associate Professor of Spanish at SUNY College at Cortland. She received her Ph.D. in Spanish Language and Culture from Syracuse University. Kattau has published articles on Latin American women writers and Latin American New Song (Nueva cancion) and is also an award winning singer/songwriter. She has five albums, produced three compilation benefit CDs and has created multimedia presentations and music videos on art and activism. Christopher Kennedy

Christopher Kennedy is the author of Ennui Prophet (BOA Editions, Ltd.), Encouragement for a Man Falling to His Death (BOA Editions, Ltd.), which received the Isabella Gardner Poetry Award in 2007, Trouble with the Machine (Low Fidelity Press), and Nietzsche's Horse (Mitki/Mitki Press). His work has appeared in many print and on-line journals and magazines, including Plume, New York Tyrant, Ninth Letter, Wigleaf, The Threepenny Review, Mississippi Review, Ploughshares, and McSweeney's. María Negroni (Argentina) has published several books of poetry: Islandia, El viaje de la noche, Arte y Fuga, Cantar la nada, La Boca del Infierno and Interludio in Berlin, among others; essays: Ciudad Gótica, Museo Negro, El testigo lúcido, Galería Fantástica, Pequeño Mundo Ilustrado and El arte del error, and two novels El sueño de Ursula and La Anunciación. Islandia, Night Journey, Andanza (The Tango Lyrics) and Mouth of Hell have appeared in English by Station Hill Press (2000), Princeton University Press (2002), Quattro Books (2013) and Action Books (2013) respectively. Negroni received a Guggenheim fellowship for poetry in 1994, a Rockefeller Foundation fellowship in 1998, the Fundación Octavio Paz fellowship for poetry 2001 and The New York Foundation for the Arts fellowship in 2005. She has taught at Sarah Lawrence College since 1999 and is now directing the first Creative Writing Program to exist in Argentina at Universidad Nacional de Tres de Febrero.

Edgar Paiewonsky-Conde

Edgar Paiewonsky-Conde was born in Samaná, Dominican Republic and obtained his PhD in Hispanic literature at New York University with a thesis on the dialectics of desire in the first volume of Don Quijote. His poetry has appeared in literary magazines in the United States, Latin America and Spain, and his poems in English have been included in three anthologies of North American poetry. Paiewonsky-Conde lives in Central New York, where he teaches Latin American literature and Cervantes at Hobart & William Smith Colleges.

Gloria Posada

project, and was granted the Colombia-Mexico artistic residence and the FONCA/CONALCULTA award of Mexico among others.

Suzanne Shane

An alum of the Syracuse University Creative Writing Graduate Program, Suzanne Shane's poems, essays, and art reviews have appeared in various journals and magazines, including North American Review, West Branch, Song, Corresponding Voices (2002 inaugural edition), The Comstock Review, The Mirror Eye, and Women Artists Datebook. A collection of her poems, This Wayward Grace, came out with FootHills Publishing in 2009. From 1993-2015 she worked at SU Abroad, developing new programs and overseas opportunities for students of all majors.

Bruce Smith

Bruce Smith is the author of six books of poems, The Common Wages, Silver and Information, Mercy Seat, The Other Lover (which was a finalist for both the National Book Award and the Pulitzer Prize), Songs for Two Voices, and Devotions. Devotions has been named a finalist for the National Book Award, the National Book Critics Circle Award and the Los Angeles Times Book Award and won the William Carlos Williams Award from the American Academy of Poets. His poems of his have appeared in The Best American Poetry, The New Yorker, The Nation, The New Republic, The Paris Review, The Partisan Review, Kenyon Review, Poetry, The American Poetry Review, The Times Literary Supplement [London] and were included in the Best of the Small Presses anthology for 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010. Smith is currently a Professor of English at Syracuse University.

Madeleine Stratford

Madeleine Stratford is a poet, a literary translator and an associate professor of Translation at the Université du Québec en Outaouais. Her first poetry book, Des mots dans la neige (éditions anagrammes, 2009) was awarded the 2009 Orpheus Poetry Prize in France. She has published literary translations in various journals, including Calque, Corresponding Voices, Alba Londres, carte blanche and TransLit. Her French translation of Ce qu'il faut dire a des fissures by Uruguayan poet Tatiana Oroño (Paris, L'Oreille du Loup, 2012) was awarded the 2013 John Glassco Prize for Literary Translation by the Literary Translators' Association of Canada, and also

received a commendation from the jury of the 2012 Nelly Sachs Translation Prize in France. In 2016, Elle nage (La Peuplade, 2016), her French version of the novel Swim, also by Marianne Apostolides, was shortlisted for a Governor general award (Translation into French).

Lila Zemborain

Lila Zemborain is an Argentine poet and critic who has lived in New York since 1985. She is the author of several poetry collections: Abrete sésamo debajo del agua (1993), Usted (1998), Guardianes del secreto (2002) - translated into English as Guardians of the Secret (2009), Malvas orquídeas del mar (2004) - translated into English as Mauve Sea-Orchids (2007) - Rasgado (2006) -translated into French as Déchiré (2013), El rumor de los bordes (2011), Diario de la hamaca paraguaya (2014), Materia blanda (2014), and the chapbooks Ardores (1989), and Pampa (2001). She has been the director and editor of the Rebel Road Series (2000-2007) and, since 2004, she curates the KJCC Poetry Series at New York University. In 2007 she was awarded a John Simon Guggenheim fellowship, in 2010 a Residency Fellowship at the Millay Colony, and in 2015 she was a finalist for the Festival de la Lira Awarad, from Ecuador.
