



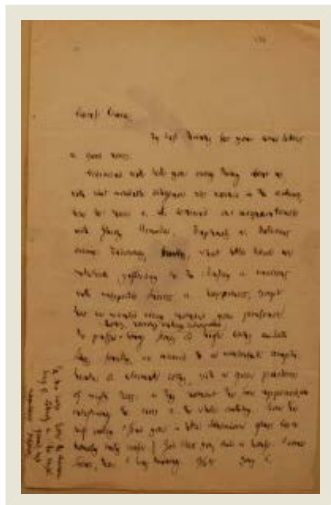

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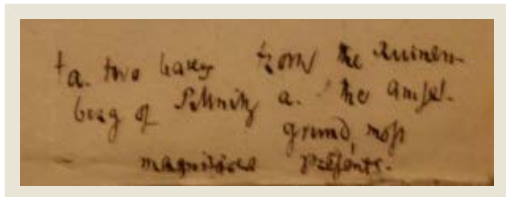
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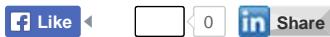


...a leaf? I wondered. I turned back to the text and took another look at that little note in the lower left corner:



He enclosed two leaves. Okay, so one didn't make it, but here I was, looking at a leaf well over a hundred years old. Someone had cared enough about that leaf to keep it long enough for it to find its way to Syracuse University Library in 1888 when von Ranke's personal library became the foundation of the University's library, and then it had happily thrived in our library and then in our department so I could find it in the 21st century! How cool is that?

Well. Some time later I was lucky enough to turn my part-time student job into a full-time staff position. I've seen many exciting things during my time here – including 14th-century books of hours, a papyrus fragment, cuneiform tablets, an Academy Award, and so much more — but sometimes I stop and think fondly of that little leaf that started it all, in the collection that started it all for this library.
