
Helen Wheatley Johnson '25 was thrilled when Bob Foree visited her this spring to thank her for her gift of life. Her contribution of cardiac resuscitation equipment for the Carrier Dome made the critical difference when Foree suffered a heart attack during a football game last fall.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

As he walked up the hill from Marshall Street to the Carrier Dome last September, Bob Foree of Unadilla, New York, didn't feel well. He had indigestion and found himself short of breath.

But Syracuse was playing Cincinnati, and Foree's wife and granddaughter were looking forward to the football game. They found their seats in the Carrier Dome and Foree settled in, ignoring his discomfort.

The next thing he knew, he'd died.

But only for a moment. Dome medical personnel with cardiac resuscitation equipment were at his side almost instantly. They revived him and whisked him away to the hospital. After a brief stay, he recovered from his heart attack.

Foree owes his life to Helen Wheatley Johnson '25 of Syracuse. Her gift of cardiac resuscitation equipment gives the Carrier Dome its reputation as the best place in Syracuse to be—other than a hospital—if you have a heart attack.

Johnson made her gift of life after she lost her husband, James '25, because the ambulance responding to her frantic phone call did not have the needed equipment. When she decided to honor his memory through a gift to SU, she did it in a way to help prevent others from suffering a similar loss.

"My husband and I both loved our years at the University," Johnson says. "He was a Deke and I was in Gamma Phi. We were college sweethearts."

Since Johnson, who also belongs to the Society of Fellows, gave the advanced life support equipment in 1979, medical personnel have used it 259 times. Each year they make at least one full-arrest save; in 1993, Foree was one of two whose lives were saved.

Strangely enough, Helen

has never seen the Dome's cardiac equipment because she can no longer manage the walking required. But she hears about its wonderful effects.

"One woman called to thank me for the nicest Christmas present she ever received: her husband's life," Johnson says. "I'm so happy when I hear something like that."

Gifts from alumni affect the life of the University in unexpected ways. While many people give money for scholarships, some, like Johnson, support equipment, innovative programs, physical facilities, or works of art. Some gifts nourish the mind while others elevate the soul. All of them make a difference.

There's no question that by the mid-eighties, SU's *Centro de Estudios Hispanicos* was languishing. Created in 1945, it had been acclaimed as one of the most important centers for the study of Hispanic culture in the United States. But 40 years later, funds had dried up and it seemed in danger of closing.

Then *un ángel* appeared in the person of **Morris S. Weeden '41** of Lake Forest, Illinois, retired vice chairman of Morton Thiokol and an honorary SU trustee.

"I've always had an interest in languages," says Weeden. "I think truly educated people are able to speak more than their own language, or at least understand a bit of another."

Today the renamed Morris and Jane Weeden *Centro de Estudios Hispanicos* is thriving. In addition to its influence outside SU, the center originated the Spanish doctoral program and brings important figures in Spanish studies to campus.

Some gifts given to the University are historical treasures. **Dr. David** '45 and

Phyllis Freeman Poushter '47 of

Syracuse had collected foreedge painted books since early in their marriage. Fore-edge painting is a unique art form dating back to mid-seventeenth century England. Each book has gold leaf on its outer edges. When one grips the book and fans its pages, a painting along the edges is revealed. Typically the image is a landscape or a painting of a building, although some are portraits.

"We donated 128 volumes to the University's George Arents Research Library," says Phyllis. "We're glad others can enjoy them."

As a former captain of the SU tennis team, **Steven L.**

Good '78 of Chicago remembers the starkness of the Skytop tennis courts. There was no shade, no bathroom, and no place to store equipment. In 1990, he changed all that.

Good spearheaded the fund drive to complete the Lois Good Tennis Pavilion, named in honor of his late mother. "She was an amateur tennis champ in Chicago," Good says. "What's more, she encouraged me to attend Syracuse."

After studying finance at SU, Good received a law degree, then joined his father's national real estate auction firm, Sheldon Good and Company. Now president, he has spurred company growth to sales of \$700 million a year.

He became involved as an SU alumni representative, working with the Office of Admissions, but felt he could do more. "I wanted to make the University a nicer place," he says. "My mother would have enjoyed the women's tennis tournaments now held at Skytop, but she would have loved knowing how much students and SU

faculty members enjoy the pavilion even more."

By the middle of April, the SU campus often looks bedraggled. The Quad appears brown and spongy. No leaves have sprouted on the barren trees. Frankly, it's depressing.

But, thanks to **Manny Shemin '52**, it's not as gloomy as it used to be. "For the past three years, I've 'daffodiled' the campus," says Shemin of Greenwich, Connecticut, the retired president of Shemin Nurseries. "I designed a plan and send 1,000 spring bulbs each year. I think my flowers have already made a great impact on campus."

Shemin, who has also made other significant gifts to the University, such as naming the main auditorium in the Shaffer Art Building, says his donation of flowers is intended to beautify the campus. "The daffodils signal the first breath of spring. They add a terrific amount of concentrated color and make everyone feel good."

No one could anticipate a gift like Shemin's, or some of the other unusual things the University has received.

After he graduated in 1953, real estate broker **Leon**Genet of Short Hills, New Jersey, hadn't set foot on the Syracuse campus until the winter his oldest daughter went looking at colleges. Then he fell in love with SU all over again.

That spring, his wife died. His daughter enrolled at Syracuse in the fall, facing the double trauma of losing her mother and being away from home for the first time.

"The people in the College for Human Development were incredibly sensitive, lavishing time and attention on her," says Genet, whose two other

daughters also eventually graduated from Syracuse.

Genet repaid the school by funding the Genet Auditorium and the Genet Gallery for costumes and the decorative arts in Slocum Hall, and promising to bring the who's who of fashion and retailing to campus as speakers in the Sue Ann Genet Lecture Series.

Genet lived up to his word. For 13 years, the elite of the industry have trekked to Syracuse to meet with students and lecture. The 52 speakers to date include famous designers and CEOs of the nation's retailing giants.

"These people go back into their worlds, talk about Syracuse, and enhance its reputation," Genet says. "My family just couldn't ask for anything better."

A few years ago, the School of Management had a problem. Faculty members couldn't talk to each other or the outside world—on their computers, that is. The school badly needed a technological lift.

Craig Benson, who received his M.B.A. in 1978, saw the solution. He is chairman and chief operating officer of Cabletron Systems in Rochester, New Hampshire, a company that manufactures computer-net-

work-related equipment.

"Craig gave us network adapter cards that went into every computer used by faculty and staff members," explains
Associate Dean Sevilimedu Raj.
"What's more, he sent his staff members to Syracuse to help us install them."

As a result, faculty members not only communicate with each other and outsiders via computer, they can

also send documents such as spreadsheets and images.

"Benson's personal knowledge and generous contribution moved us into the computer generation," says Raj.

Sometimes what Syracusans really need is a quiet spot, and it's even better if that place is one of beauty and inspiration.

The sculpture garden beside the Shaffer Art Building is just such a place. In all but the worst weather, people find their way there to sit on its benches and enjoy the works of art. The

centerpiece of the garden is the sculpture of *Moses* by Ivan Mestrovic, a piece that's inspirational without being religious.

The University had been storing the plaster for *Moses*, a piece never cast by the artist. **Don '46** and **Marilyn Johnson Giancola '46** of Syracuse and Boca Raton, Florida, provided funds to make a mold from the plaster. Then a cast-relief was made in bronze and patinaed.

"We knew something should be done with it when we first saw the plaster," Giancola recalls. "It makes a fitting centerpiece for the sculpture garden."

Giancola, president of D.J. Giancola Exports, says, "Groups use the sculpture garden for gatherings, but it means more to me that everyone can come and just relax quietly with the *Moses*."

Who's to say what enriches life at the University the most. Unique gifts often make the difference between an ordinary college experience and a very special one for everyone at Syracuse.

Kenneth Foresti liked the thought of being an alumnus so much he started practicing even before he graduated in May.

During his senior year, Foresti served as president of Syracuse University Student-Alumni (SUSA), a four-year-old student group dedicated to strengthening relationships between SU students and alumni.

"We discovered very special alumni out in the world who helped make Syracuse what it is," Foresti explains. "The opportunity to meet them and make connections for the future is invaluable."

Members often work with alumni clubs in their hometowns, says the finance major from New Hartford, New York. "When we're home we attend club events, especially the New Student Send-Offs many of them host."

What's in it for alumni? "We offer them a way to learn about campus issues and student concerns. Alumni use us as a bridge to Syracuse," Foresti says.

According to Phyllis Chase, senior director of alumni relations: "Two students serve as representatives to the Alumni Association Board. Many spend time each week helping alumni office staff members, and we rely on them as hosts for Reunion and Homecoming."

Chase considers participating in SUSA an excellent way to prepare students to become enthusiastic alumni. "We hope to develop people who will assume leadership roles in the alumni clubs and Alumni Association."

SUSA sponsors a variety of activities throughout the year. The annual Alumni Network Night, usually held mid-winter, has developed into one of the most popular events.

"This year 22 alumni attended, mostly younger people who had just gone through the job search process themselves. We publicized the event on campus and many students came," says Foresti. Speakers included local television newscaster Laura Hand Wright '71.

The group marked National Orange Day on March 24 by sponsoring a contest to guess the number of orange and blue jelly beans in a jar. The money raised went to the University's scholarship fund; first prize was dinner with the Chancellor.

"SUSA members are bright, enthusiastic, articulate, and hard-working young people," says Chase. "They reinforce the value of the Syracuse experience."





THE WAY IT WAS



100 MEN AND A GIRL

As freshmen hiking from Watson Hall to the old Hendricks Field south of Archbold Stadium in September 1954, we struggled with new and old both within us and around us. Anxieties about the future muted our excitement, while we responded to the scent of a crisp Syracuse autumn. In just three nights we'd burst from Archbold's eerie tunnel with SU's razz-ma-tazz band.

Cold, muddy, and dimly lit by sparsely placed pole lights, Hendricks Field conveyed something very genuine. Our hyper band director, Marice Stith, adjudicated from atop its crumbling stands, screeching through his staticky loudspeaker. His creativity overcame the obstacles and took our shabby group to a higher level. He instilled pride and commitment. Only later would we realize something special had happened.

Our billing called the band "100 Men and A Girl." Legend had it the University added the "girl" to take attention off the inept 100. Clad in white bucks, blue blazers, and gray flannels (donated by a local men's store), our crowning glory was our orange-banded straw hats. On opening night, under Archbold's lights, we looked like a million, saluting our hats after Alta Burg's fiery batons turned the skies meteoric.

We spent many hours rehearsing on Hendricks Field, never quite meeting Stith's standards. But at game time, when we hit that tunnel wearing our 200 white bucks and gloves, we rose to the occasion. As we charged down the field, dazzling Alta pranced in front of us like a diamond. We were even more mesmerized than the crowd, and 100 men secretly fell in love.

Often a covetous fan would snatch a hat. So, reluctantly, we hurled them into the crowd one Colgate game, after personalizing them in hopes they'd be returned. We shared camaraderie and thrills, from the Polo Grounds to the Cotton Bowl. The mud, sweat, and trudging at old Hendricks paid off.

Much of that field is long gone, succumbing to Sadler Hall. The all-male band vanished and the straw hats never reappeared. But the memory is forever.

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
