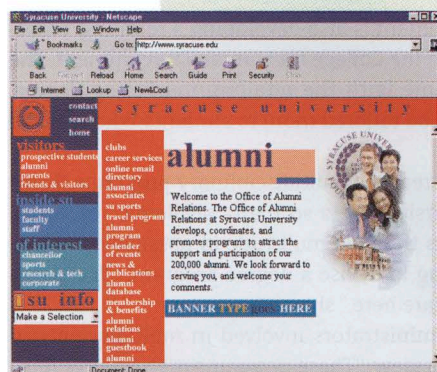

ENGINEERING ALUMNI CLUB

In 1991, it was such an obvious move that Doug Cagwin '41 of Fayetteville, N.Y., was amazed no one had ever suggested it. Why not start an alumni club for graduates of the L.C. Smith College of Engineering and Computer Science? In less than a year, a steering committee of 30 enthusiastic alumni did just that.

"We feel our purpose is to be of service to the college and the University by raising funds for them," Cagwin explains. "We're not primarily a social organization, although we have held tailgate parties before football games. It's nice getting to know people you wouldn't have known otherwise because you were in school at different times."

Recently the club added 150 members for a grand total of nearly 500 donating members. Over the years members have raised \$28,000 and funded 13 partial student scholarships.

Their involvement is more than a financial one, however. Members often visit high schools to talk about engineering at Syracuse. "We also act as mentors to undergraduate students," says Cagwin, now a club associate director. "We've had great success matching alumni with students interested in specific disciplines. It's something we enjoy doing, knowing it helps the University."

AN ORANGE ON YOUR PLATE?

Many alumni have asked about the possibility of obtaining license plates that boast of their affiliation with Syracuse. We think it's a great idea! Currently there is no standard SU design for plates.

Some alumni groups, such as the Northern and Central New Jersey alum-



ni clubs, are trying to develop SU alumni license plates. Experience shows that it usually takes a large group of interested alumni to make this happen. Check with your nearest club to see if such an effort is under way.

Some individualists do it by themselves. William Dodds '60 of Wilmington, Delaware, has a plate that declares "FOR SU," while wife Joan Fellows Dodds '64 chimes in with "FOR SU2."

NEW STUDENT SEND-OFFS

Ask Bridgett Wines, Class of 2002, what she thinks about the New Student Send-Off party last summer given by the Houston alumni club, and you'll hear an enthusiastic response. "It was terrific, really helpful," she says. "Alumni gave me a lot of insight by telling me about their experiences at the University. I also enjoyed meeting upperclass students who told me what it was like to come to Syracuse from Texas. The whole event made me feel more comfortable about coming to SU."

Our area alumni clubs know there's nothing like a good send-off to inspire enthusiasm among new SU students. This year 27 alumni clubs hosted send-off parties for new students and their parents, often at informal picnics or barbecues. Some clubs awarded scholarships and others distributed SU Bookstore gift certificates.

New students appreciate the opportunity to meet others from their hometowns to compare residence hall assignments

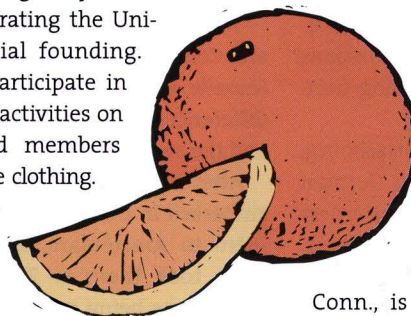
and class schedules—and to arrange rides home during vacations.

The Houston club hosted a successful party with nearly 40 people attending, according to Barry White '91, past president. "Many returning students attended, happy to share their own first-year experiences with this year's crop of newcomers," he says. "Returning students spoke eloquently and new students were impressed when they heard these young women and men talk about internships with businesses and broadcast stations that they'd secured through the University. It was a terrific way to start the college experience."

Parents of new students also appreciate the send-off events. They learn about the University and have a chance to meet other parents.

Several awards were given during Homecoming '98.

Outstanding Alumni Awards

Two alumni received the Outstanding Alumni Award, which recognizes service to the University.

Henry Grethel '54, president and CEO of Henry Grethel Apparel in New York City, is an avid supporter of the College for Human Development's Genet Lecture Series. Over the years he has provided many student internship positions as well as financial support. He now serves on the college's Retail Advisory Board.

Outstanding Young Alumni Awards

Benjamin I. Green III '85 of East Orange, N.J., works in programming at WBGO radio. His extensive career in communications has included positions at radio stations in the New York City area. He is involved with SU's mentoring program for African American students and participates in the Friends of Syracuse alumni club.

Outstanding Teacher Award

The Outstanding Teacher Award went to Professor Susan Bonzi, director of the undergraduate program in the School of Information Studies, who considers the school's 400-plus majors her personal charge. She teaches the introductory

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freshman course in information technology, ensuring that new students become proficient with these important tools.

TRAVELS WITH SU

Professor Gerd Schneider was, frankly, suspicious of organized tours. But that was before he went on one.

"I thought I'd be sitting on a bus, with people pointing out something on the right and something on the left as we sped past," says Schneider, who teaches German literature and language at SU. "I was afraid we'd cover a whole country every 24 hours, but it wasn't like that at all. Now I feel this kind of touring is the best way to travel."

Last summer Schneider and his wife, Georgia, joined University alumni on a trip called *Legendary Passage: A Cruise on the Rhine and Moselle Rivers*. Because of his knowledge of Germany, Schneider served as lecturer as well as traveler.

The group flew to Lucerne, Switzerland, which Schneider describes as absolutely gorgeous. They spent three days at a luxurious hotel on the lake, taking excursions into the countryside and recovering from lingering traces of jet lag.

The group traveled by bus to Strasbourg, where Schneider taught travelers German phrases to help them shop and place orders in the city's charming pastry markets. "Later people told me they ate too much cake because they just kept on ordering," Schneider says with a laugh.

They boarded their 101-passenger deluxe cruiser in Strasbourg and headed up the Rhine River, stopping to admire castles and visit historic sites. "Many people made purchases when we stopped at Speyer and Rüsselsheim, known for their wine and chocolate with brandy," Schneider says.

The trip continued to Mainz, Wiesbaden, and Cologne before branching off onto the Moselle River. Schneider pointed out the differences between the wines of Moselle and the sweeter Rhine wines.

After rejoining the Rhine, the group disembarked in Düsseldorf, where buses took them to Amsterdam. From there excursions took them to Edam, where they saw cheese being made, and other points of interest before leaving for home.

"The beauty of the trip was that while the excursions were interesting, we had plenty of free time to do other things. In Amsterdam, for instance, many of us visited the Van Gogh Museum," Schneider says.

The professor lectured several times, sometimes on the sights they were about to see, but also

on the differences between American and German culture in everyday life. "I told our friends that in German restaurants, people often share tables; if they see someone sitting alone, they may approach them and ask if seats are available. Several did just that and enjoyed the conversations they had."

It's not surprising Schneider refers to his fellow travelers as friends. "Besides our group of Syracuse alumni, there were groups from universities in California, Montana, and Oregon," he says. "People didn't stay just with others from their own institutions, however. We mixed and exchanged information, danced, and talked. By the second day, a wonderful sense of group camaraderie was established. These were intelligent, interested people, and I still exchange letters and e-mail with them."

Would he travel on a similar organized tour again? "The trip exceeded all my expectations," Schneider proclaims. "I'm not sure I'd go any other way now."

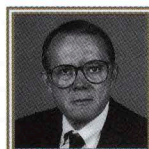

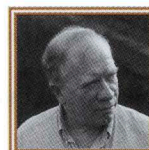
Raymond A. Jansen Jr. '60 (A&S) was appointed senior vice president for the Times Mirror of Los

Douglas B. Hartford G'66 (NEW) is vice president for public affairs at Metropolitan

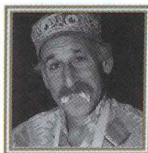
State University in St. Paul, Minn. Previously he was vice chancellor for external affairs at Indiana University.

"Although we are a foster care agency, we also do a lot of anti-eviction work,"

she explains. "Families living in public housing often have many problems that keep them from paying the rent. The most rewarding part of my job is helping a family stay in their home and then seeing that family become more self-sufficient because a family member takes advantage of our agency's other programs."

Wong believes her agency and others should

focus more on children. "If we can get children into an early childhood center to give them a solid start, that's a success," she declares.

Wong has been interested in social service since her SU days when she was enrolled in a special program that allowed her to choose concentrations in social work and early childhood education. After law school she practiced with Bronx Legal Services and then served as coordinator of the New York City Bar Association's Legal Clinic for the Homeless. She took her present position after directing the Youth Advocacy Project and chairing the steering committee of Emancipation from Poverty for Riverside Church.

Wong has never been tempted by private practice. "I like this kind of work," she says. "It lets me see directly how I'm helping people. Focusing more on children is the way to eliminate problems that frequently continue through succeeding generations."

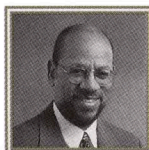

David Rockwell '79

Here's one sure way to recognize a David Rockwell design: It doesn't look like anything you've ever seen before. Whether it's the witty Art Deco 20-screen Star Southfield Theater in Detroit; the fireworks-spouting, 42-foot-high Coke bottle made out of 983 bats, 7 mitts, and 5,788 baseballs at Atlanta's Turner Field; or the 40 sensory-overload Planet Hollywoods he's created from Tahoe to Tel Aviv, Rockwell's work is guaranteed to knock your socks off.

Rockwell virtually owns what's called "entertainment architecture," which transforms dining (or baseball-going) into a theatrical experience. One summer during his SU days he apprenticed with a Broadway lighting designer/theater consultant. "I saw the magic of the theater and the power it has to transform everyday experience," he says. "When I returned to campus my passion for architecture grew as I found ways to weave in the other things I loved."

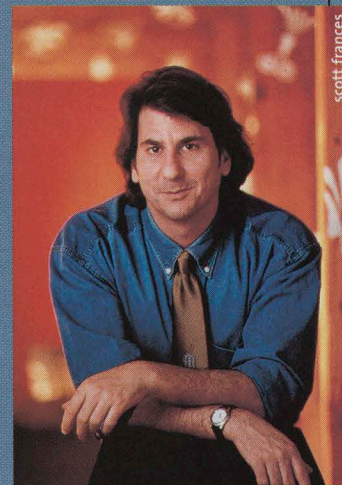
Today he heads the 200-employee Rockwell Group and believes successful design projects grow out of good ideas from clients. "My job is to draw those thoughts out and visualize them," he says. "We only accept projects that challenge us creatively and allow us to work with clients who enjoy the exchange of ideas."

The charismatic Rockwell is currently engrossed in plans for a 1,600-seat theater for Cirque d'Soleil in Orlando; renovating Grand Central Station's lower concourse and restoring Radio City Music Hall in New York City; and designing a permanent 3,000-seat home for the Academy Awards in Los Angeles, among dozens of other things.

In recent years Rockwell has hired a number of SU architecture graduates. "They come out of school well rounded, with great conceptual skills and good ability to present and verbalize," he says. "They make an impact right away, which is important in a firm as fast-moving as ours."

His advice to other dream-filled mavericks? "Pay attention to the things you're passionate about, even if they seem unrelated to your field. You'll find great creativity and joy in your work if you can figure out how to put them together."

Joseph Lampe '53, G'55

h e'd lectured on venture capital to many management students over the years, but this was the first time Joseph O. Lampe had ever held class in a traditional English pub in the heart of London. That was only one of the unique features in his most recent trip to Europe. While Lampe has traveled extensively over the years, this time he and his wife, Shawn, went abroad for a particular purpose: to visit the University's study centers in London, Florence, and Madrid. After all, the chairman of SU's Board of Trustees should know what the University is doing around the world.

"I feel our overseas connections—whether in Europe, Africa, or Asia—are vitally important if Syracuse is going to be a major international player," says Lampe, who lives in Phoenix, Arizona. "Our Division of International Programs Abroad (DIPA) is a facet of the University we should talk about all the time. The experiences students have are remarkable."

No one who knows Lampe is surprised at his dedication. He's a man who proudly bleeds orange. He even claims he was born on Marshall Street, although technically his birthplace was the old Hospital of the Good Shepherd, now converted to Huntington Hall, home of the School of Education.

"I'm very appreciative of my Syracuse education," Lampe says. "I made a substantial number of friends, including members of the faculty. They spent a lot of time with me they didn't have to spend. During my undergraduate years, Sawyer Falk, head of the drama department, was a great influence on me. During law school, Bob Miller was a particular friend. He was associate dean of the law school then and later became dean."

Lampe also played freshman football under coach Roy Simmons Sr., an experience that gave him an abiding love of sports. "In those days, you couldn't play varsity sports as a freshman," he says. "Simmy was another person who affected me profoundly. He was a great coach and a wonderful influence."

As an undergraduate, Lampe studied directing in the College of Visual and Performing Arts, and minored in journalism. His father managed a string of movie theaters in Syracuse, and he considered a career in show business. But when he was accepted to SU's College of Law after his junior year, he changed focus.

After earning his law degree, Lampe spent two years in the United States Air Force before settling in Arizona. After several years in legal practice, Lampe moved into executive positions in hotel management. While living in California in the 1980s, he helped reorganize SU's alumni group. He was president of the Los Angeles club for six years, and in 1985 was invited to join the University's Board of Trustees.

Today his skills focus on real estate. He's president of Lampe and Company, a diversified real estate development and management firm in Phoenix.

Lampe is one of the University's greatest boosters. "Everything I learned at Syracuse helped me become successful," he says.

For the future, he's convinced the University will continue on the path that Chancellor Kenneth A. Shaw has established. "We're well on our way to being the leading student-centered research institution in the country. Many other universities ask us how we did it," he says.

Lampe has backed up his enthusiasm with several generous gifts to the University. He and his wife committed \$2 million to the University's Student Athlete Fund, which endows scholarships and academic-support resources for student athletes.

That gift resulted in renaming the acreage that includes all of SU's practice fields, athletics offices, Manley Field House, and the George R. Iocolano and William C. Petty Football Wing. The entire area, formerly called Colvin Park, is now the Joseph and Shawn Lampe Athletics Complex.

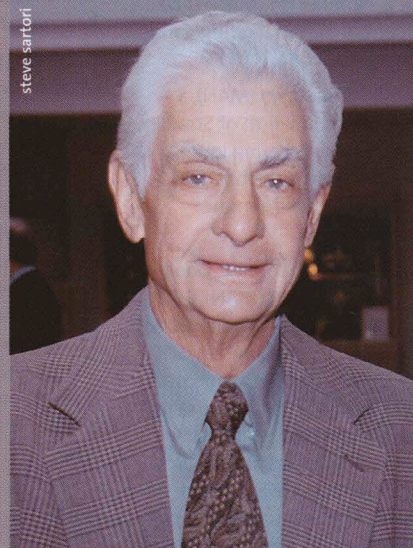
His generosity to the University and participation in its activities have brought him several honors. He received a Distinguished Service Award from the College of Law in 1991, and an Outstanding Alumni Award from SU in 1984. He's served on the College of Law's Board of Visitors since 1984.

His newest role, as chairman of the Board of Trustees, spurred his trip to SU's European centers. "Our programs abroad are phenomenal," he says. "We spent quite a bit of time with students in London, sitting in on classes, and there was that wonderful evening in the pub. The quality of student enthusiasm was energizing. All the students we met were serving internships in major companies or political parties. Members of Parliament were speaking to them. What an amazing experience!"

Lampe clearly feels great affection for the University. His vision and leadership of the Board of Trustees bode well for Syracuse's future.

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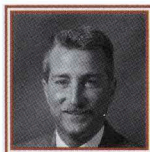

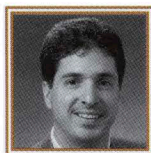

Larry Sala hustled through SU in three years—for the first degree, that is. After receiving an undergraduate degree in engineering, he went on for a graduate engineering degree and then immediately plunged into study for an M.B.A. It kept him rather busy.

Not too busy to work his way up at Anaren Microwave of East Syracuse, however. Starting as a part-time student right out of SU, Sala earned graduate degrees and quickly became vice president of marketing. He then was promoted to president of marketing, and at 32 was named president of the company.

That promotion couldn't have come at a worse time. When Sala first started with the company, it had about \$33 million in annual revenues, some 95 percent of it in electronics work for the defense industry. But when some defense contracts canceled and revenues declined to \$17 million in 1995, things became, as Sala says wryly, "very challenging."

As the new president, Sala started moving the company into the commercial communications market. Today the company designs, develops, makes, and sells complex microwave signal distribution networks and equipment for the wireless communications, satellite communications, and defense electronics markets. Since the

shift in focus, the firm has more than doubled its annual revenues to \$37.5 million and dramatically increased its payroll.

Sala feels strongly that the University made his career possible. To return the favor, his company is involved in many faculty research projects. "We pay for the education of three graduate students who work for us," he says. "We also sponsor Professor Ercument Arvas of the L.C. Smith College of Engineering and Computer Science, who is helping get the University more involved in the microwave field." Some of the firm's engineers have been mentors for student projects.

"Syracuse did it for me," Sala says. "When I became president of Anaren, there was no doubt in my mind that without my Syracuse degrees I would have had a tough time."

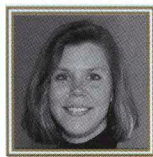

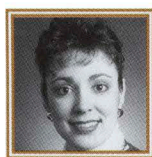

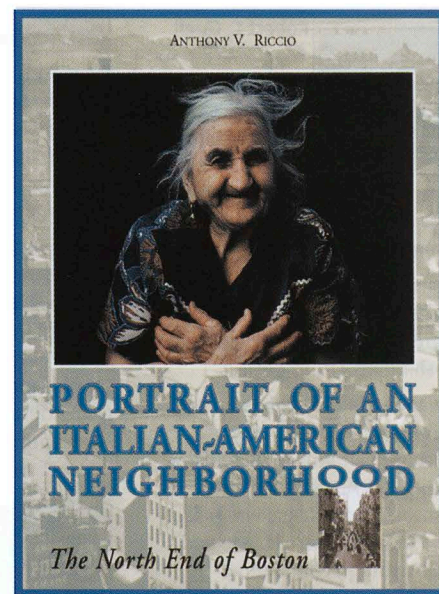
